She couldn't beleive how quickly the day passed during site visit.



The answer is **B** because "**beleive**" is incorrect in this context. The correct word should be "**believe**," as it follows the common spelling rule "**i before e except after c.**" The word "**beleive**" is a common misspelling, but the correct form has "**i**" before "**e**." The rest of the sentence is correct, so **B** is the valid answer.

"**Beneath**" implies under the soup, which is incorrect. Therefore with, option **E** is the only valid answer.*

And I had the high intention of reading many other books besides. I was rather literary in college—one year I wrote a series of very solemn and obvious editorials for the "Yale News"—and now I was going to bring back all such things into my life and become again that most limited of all specialists,



15. the "well-rounded man." This isn't just an epigram—life is much more successfully looked at from a single window, after all.

- It was a matter of chance that I should have rented a house in one of the strangest communities in North America. It was on that slender riotous island which extends itself due east of New York and where there are, among other natural curiosities,
20. two unusual formations of land. Twenty miles from the city a pair of enormous eggs, identical in contour and separated only by a courtesy bay, jut out into the most domesticated body of salt water in the Western Hemisphere, the great wet barnyard of Long Island Sound. They are not perfect ovals—like the egg in the Columbus story they are both crushed flat at the contact end—but their physical resemblance must
25. be a source of perpetual confusion to the gulls that fly overhead. To the wingless a more arresting phenomenon is their dissimilarity in every particular except shape and size.




