





*The answer is **B** because there should be an apostrophe in "**o'clock**". This contraction of "of the clock" requires an apostrophe. None of the other lines contain punctuation or capitalisation errors, making **B** the only valid answer.*





*The answer is **D** because "barbeque" is incorrect in this context. The correct spelling should be "barbecue." This is a common misspelling where people often replace the "c" with a "q." All other words in the sentence are spelled correctly, so **D** is the valid answer.*

*The answer is **B** because "while" correctly indicates that the students were listening at the same time as the professor was explaining. "When" could work but is less precise about the simultaneous nature of the actions. "During" would require a noun (e.g., "during the lecture") rather than a clause with a subject and verb. "Since" incorrectly suggests the listening started at a point in time and continued for a reason. "Until" incorrectly implies the listening stopped when the explanation began. Therefore **while**, option **B** is the only valid answer.*

Option A is correct

Three-fourths of 2400,

$$\frac{3}{4} \times 2400 = 1800$$

Adding 360 to the result

$$1800 + 360 = \mathbf{2160}$$
