

Writing Plan and Sequencing	Comment	Check
Your writing must be well-structured and make clear sense. Planning will improve your writing significantly, so make sure you take time to plan effectively:	Plan is clear and detailed, with techniques listed and an idea for structure.	
Beginning: This is the first paragraph of your descriptive task. You want to begin by describing your first sight of the object – perhaps building up some suspense for its discovery first – and then describe your initial, visual impressions.	Suspense is built in the short opening paragraph as we wait to discover what this sparkling object is. In the first full paragraph the mask is described with fluency and originality.	
Have you introduced the main character/setting in an interesting way?		
Middle: This is where you develop your writing. Pick some key details to describe in full, or build intrigue by focusing on a key aspect of what you are describing. Could you engage with the object in a new way?	Mood and atmosphere is built in this paragraph, and the narrator interacts with the object in a new way: she puts on the mask.	
Have you built tension and used a focal or temporal shift?		
End: This is the end of your descriptive writing, where you might want to find a new perspective on the scene or introduce a focal shift. For example, if the scene has been cheerful so far, can you find a sombre side? Could you talk about how the object makes you feel, or any questions it raises in your mind?	The final paragraph focuses on the narrator's realisation that the mask is her grandma's. This leads her to acquire a new perspective on her grandmother, making for a satisfying conclusion.	
Have you come to a satisfying conclusion – has the object made you realise something new, or could you have a strong emotional reaction to it?
