

Writing Plan and Sequencing	Comment	Check
Your writing must be well-structured and make clear sense. Planning will improve your writing significantly, so make sure you take time to plan effectively:	The plan accommodates a clear beginning, middle and end.	
Beginning: Introduce your point of view on this subject.	A range of techniques have been included, such as repetition, rhetorical questions and use of personal pronouns to directly address the reader and make them feel responsible.	✓
Have you used a hook which makes it engaging and catches the reader's attention? Have I clearly outlined my view/perspective on the topic?		
Middle: This is where you develop your ideas. Describe a scenario which relates to the subject and illustrate it through anecdote or realistic sounding facts and statistics.	Anecdote is being used to encourage the audience to relate to the issue. Main ideas are repeated and reinforced throughout.	
Have you commented on the effect of your anecdote or facts / statistics? Are you arguing your case with focus and passion?		\
End: This is the point where you build up to your main point in response to the subject. You need to leave your readers in no doubt that you are right and they must feel enthused and informed by your writing.	Ideas are summarised and presented passionately in a strong, concluding paragraph.	✓
Have you drawn all of your ideas together logically and left the readers with no choice but to agree with you?
