

Writing Plan and Sequencing	Comment	Check
Your writing must be well-structured and make clear sense. Planning will improve your writing significantly, so make sure you take time to plan effectively: Beginning: This is the exposition of your writing where you introduce the character and setting. You need to make your reader feel emotional involved with your character's life/situation. Introduce the character's dilemma (problem). Have you introduced the main character/setting in an interesting way?	Plan is very detailed and explains the techniques that will be used in each paragraph as well as how the plot will develop. The exposition creates an atmosphere of gloom with pathetic fallacy and introduces the protagonist: "withered face of a man".	
Middle: This is where you develop your story and build tension. Here it is a good idea to use a focal shift or temporal shift, using flashback or moving to a new setting. Have you built tension and used a focal or temporal shift?	Tension is built by releasing information slowly. We gradually realise that the protagonist has become lonely and bitter. During the flashback we develop sympathy for him.	
End: This is the resolution, where you reach the climax and/or the character's dilemma is resolved. Have you drawn all of your ideas together and left the story on a cliff-hanger (climax) or resolved your character's problem?	The story ends on a cliff-hanger just before the climax, allowing the reader to picture what happens next with the ominous "eye".
