Your writing must be well-structured and make clear sense. Planning will improve your writing significantly, so make sure you take time to plan effectively:	The piece of writing has a clear and well planned structure which contributes to the overall success of the article. The introduction creates a powerful hook which immediately engages the reader, whilst the use of a single word paragraph creates an interesting turning point, reflecting the gravity of the subject matter. The conclusion successfully conveys the ultimate message of the piece, delivering the information in a serious and detailed way.	
Beginning: Introduce the topic clearly. Have you adopted the right tone for your audience? Does your opening paragraph clearly explain what your instructions are for? Have you included a clear title?	Paragraph 1: Use a hook to ensure that your reader is alert to the importance of your instructions. Make it clear that by following your instructions, they are about to learn something vital. Ensure you vary your sentence lengths and punctuation for effect, using short sentences for impact.
