Your writing must be well-structured and make clear sense. Planning will improve your writing significantly, so make sure you take time to plan effectively:	Plan is comprehensive and includes techniques to be used as well as mapping out the plot.	
Beginning: This is the exposition of your writing where you introduce the character and setting. You need to make your reader feel emotionally involved with your character's life/situation. Introduce the character's dilemma (problem).	The exposition introduces the setting through visual imagery and build towards the introduction of Alice, the protagonist.	
Have you introduced the main character/setting in an interesting way?		
Middle: This is where you develop your story and build tension. Here it is a good idea to use a focal shift or temporal shift, using flashback or moving to a new setting.	Paragraphs 3 and 4 introduce the dilemma and begin to create tension. Figurative language created a vivi image of Alice. Dialogue has been planned for to develop the plot of the story. Flashback is used to give us an insight into Alice's thinking.	✓
Have you built tension and used a focal or temporal shift?		
End: This is the resolution, where you reach the climax and/or the character's dilemma is resolved.	Paragraphs 5 and 6 use focal shift to jolt the reader back into the present, using vidual and auditory imagery. Paragraph 6 ends on the given line.
