

Writing Plan and Sequencing	Comment	Check
Your writing must be well-structured and make clear sense. Planning will improve your writing significantly, so make sure you take time to plan effectively:	Plan is clear and detailed, with techniques listed and an idea for structure.	
Beginning: This is first paragraph of your descriptive task. You want to set the scene in a generalised way, perhaps commenting on time of day or year. Build an overall impression of the scene before zooming in on details later. Introduce characters or central features of what is being described in this paragraph.	The time of year - the first scorching day of the summer - is referenced, as well as the place, the banks of a river. Characters are introduced, the bathers, so the reader feels grounded in the scene.	✓
Have you introduced the main character/setting in an interesting way?		
Middle: This is where you develop your writing. Pick some key details to describe in full, or build intrigue by focus on a character or key aspect of what you are describing.	Mood and atmosphere is built in this paragraph, and specific details are described: the trees, the smoke, the children.	✓
Have you built tension and used a focal or temporal shift?		
End: This is the end of your descriptive writing, where you might want to find a new perspective on the scene or introduce a focal shift. For example, if the scene has been cheerful so far, can you find a sombre side? Could you focus on a character in the scene?	The final paragraph focuses on a teenage character, offering his perspective on the scene for an intriguing ending.	
Have you drawn all of your ideas together and left the story on a cliff-hanger (climax) or resolved your character's problem?
